

Presenter Guidelines

1 POSTER PRESENTERS

1.1 Onsite at the Conference

Speakers will need to register at the registration desk upon arrival at the conference to collect their name badge and related materials. From there, you will be directed to the Poster Display Area. A list of posters, allocated numbers, and poster display times will be available in this area. Please ensure that your poster is displayed on the correct poster board, which will be labeled with your assigned Poster ID. Do not place your poster in an alternate location.

1.2 Session Details

The program is subject to change, so please check for any updates at the registration desk on-site. Poster mounting and removal times will be updated on the day of the conference. Any posters remaining at the end of the session will be discarded. A small amount of Velcro pieces for mounting your poster will be available in the poster area; however, we suggest that you bring your own Velcro pieces to ensure your poster is properly supported.

1.3 Your Poster Presentation

Authors are requested to be present next to their poster during the allocated poster session. Please note that the official conference language is English, and all presentations must be made in English. Presenters should stand by their poster during their allocated presentation time.

Three awards will be given for each conference category.

1.4 Your Poster Preparation

The poster should be a visual presentation of your submitted abstract. Posters should meet the following criteria:

Size: The dimensions of the posters should be A1 size, 594 mm wide by 841 mm high (strictly portrait orientation only—landscape is not allowed).

Title: The title should reflect the content of your poster and match your abstract submission.

Contact Information: The name, organization, email address of the corresponding author, and the affiliations of all co-authors should appear on the poster.

Lettering: The poster should be easily readable from a distance of two meters. Use upper and lower case for general content, as the use of all-capital text is difficult to read. Avoid using mixtures of type/font styles.
